Fresno Council of Governments DBE Goal Setting Methodology October 2015 – September 2018

I. In General

We are a sub recipient of the State Department of Transportation for Consolidated Planning Grant funds which include FHWA PL, FTA 5303, FTA 5304, and FTA 5311(f). We are also a direct recipient from the Federal Transit Administration through (TRAMS) for FTA 5317, FTA 5316 and FTA 5310 funds. Presently the FTA 5316 and FTA 5317 programs have been discontinued and the FTA 5310 apportionments are for purchase of transit vehicles therefor presently there are no new contracting opportunities where DBE requirements are applicable through apportionments received directly from FTA through TRAMS. Our DBE goal setting is primarily aimed at the Consolidated Planning Grant funds that are reported to Caltrans who consolidates DBE utilization for the state and reports to FTA. To avoid duplication we do not report DBE procurements through the Consolidated Planning Grant through TRAMS. If for any reason we receive Apportionments directly from FTA applicable to the DBE goal, we apply the adopted goal as a percentage of those funds. We also track DBE utilization to contracting opportunities provided by local funds, which is not required by the Federal regulations.

Our adopted DBE goals and program were previously posted to our website under a sub heading, "Doing Business with FCOG". We also posted the minutes of our public hearing adopting our goals under the agenda section of the web site. However, to provide greater transparency, we have moved the DBE section to a more prominent subheading that can be seen from the Homepage. Here is the link.

We maintain a database (bidders list) of approximately 300 consultants which includes firms, non DBE and DBE, from all around the state who are interested and qualified to perform our specialized Transportation Planning studies. Any firm possessing the qualifications to perform the type of research projects we require is encouraged to become part of our database. We start our public process in March each year by contacting everyone in the data base, advising them of our DBE program, requesting they update their DBE status, NAICS code, etc. We also publish an advertisement in the Fresno Bee notifying the public of our annual scheduled DBE public hearing in June, providing our address, phone number and inviting everyone to review our program, submit comments or attend. At the June public hearing, we explain the program, open the hearing for public comment, and adopt or update our three year DBE goal. The

minutes for the annual public hearing record the names of people attending the hearing and any comments provided.

Annually we identify a variety of technical Transportation Planning studies in our Overall Work Program and Budget that will provide contracting opportunities. During the year we solicit proposals through an RFP process in which we notify prospective consultants of our DBE program and contract requirements. The RFP's are sent to firms in our Bidders Listing which includes DBE firms. Many of our studies are complex and require various skill sets so prospective consultants typically team with various sub consultants to tailor a proposal to suit our requirements providing a natural unbinding of large contracts into smaller units. During the selection process we may discuss specific issues with individual firms regarding the project, our contract requirements, or DBE program. Depending on the project we may conduct face to face interviews with prospective consultants. We issue a prime contract to the winning proposal and the prime contractor subcontracts with the various firms that team up for their proposal.

On March 16, 2015 Fresno COG notified everyone listed in our consultant data base, inviting them to update their DBE status. Notice was also posted to the Fresno Cog web site inviting interested DBE's to register in our data base, providing registration forms, instructions and a link to NAICS codes. A public notice was published, appearing in the Fresno Bee, informing everyone of our public hearing to set DBE goals, scheduled for June 25, 2015, providing address, phone number and inviting comments. Forty five persons attended the June 25, 2015 public hearing, including three consultants of which one is a known certified DBE. The Minutes for the June 25, 2015 meeting include the presentation of Agenda Item IIG. Public Hearing Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Report – Resolution 2015-15, any comments from the public, and a list of those present at the hearing on the last page. The board passed resolution 2015-15 setting the 2015-16 – 2017-18 DBE goals at 15.65%.

On March 12, 2016, Fresno COG notified everyone listed in our consultant database inviting them to update their DBE status. Notice was also posted to the Fresno Cog web site inviting interested DBE's to register in our data base, providing registration forms, instructions and a link to NAICS codes. A public notice was published, appearing in the Fresno Bee, informing of a public hearing to set DBE goals scheduled for June 30, 2016, providing address, phone number and inviting comments. Thirty three persons attended the June 30, 2016 public hearing, The Minutes for the June 30, 2016 meeting including the presentation of IID.Public Hearing Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Report — Resolution 2016-12. The minutes include any comments from the public and a list of those present at the hearing on the last page. The board passed resolution 2016-12 adjusting the 2015-16 — 2017-18 DBE goals to 14.38%.

On March 7, 2017, Fresno COG notified everyone listed in our consultant database inviting them to update their DBE status. A public notice was placed in the Fresno Bee noticing a public hearing and inviting interested parties to appear and or submit comments regarding the Fresno Council of Governments DBE program public hearing on June 29, 2017. Staff will present

Resolution 2017-11 recommending the 2015-16 - 2017-18 DBE goal be adjusted to 14.31%. Any comments received will be read into the record at the public hearing.

The overall DBE participation in our program is currently at least equal to or above participation levels experienced by the State Department of Transportation.

Overall Goal Submission

II. Step One

Our market for contracting opportunities is highly specialized. We compile a bidders list from a contractor data base we have built over the years, of all firms ready, willing, and able to compete for DOT assisted contracts through our technical planning process, including firms that are certified DBE's. We use the data base to calculate our base DBE Goal and to solicit proposals through a Request for Proposal process. We use the ratio of DBE firms registered in our data base, divided by the total of all firms to develop a base figure. Our bidders list presently has 301 firms in it of which 47 are DBE, equating to a base goal of 15.61%.

Step one Base Figure = 47 divided by 301 = 15.61%

A. Past Participation

The calculation of the Step 1 Base figure does not include a factor for past participation. Past participation is factored into the goal as described in Step II.

B. Use Most Refined Data Available

In order to focus more precisely on the firms ready and able to perform our specialized studies, we contact everyone in it annually, inviting interested firms to update their records, report NCIAS codes, DBE status, ect. We use the result of this exchange to update the database. Since we use the database to solicit contractors, and the contractors qualified to perform our studies must have specialized skills, we compile our data base from a variety of sources making our bidders list the most refined data available for our program.

C. Relevant Data Sources

We solicit information from similar MPO's, the State Department of Transportation, Trade Organizations and other agencies having similar contract requirements, to build

our contractor database. We also keep abreast of various governmental publications that feature articles describing agencies that have engaged in various Best Practice's. Often contacting those agencies can result in establishing contact with firms that have a record of providing outstanding performance. Firms that specialize in the type of work we offer frequent many of the same planning seminars, also attended our planning staff, providing opportunity for us to meet eager firms that fit our requirements and invite them to apply to be listed in our database.

We keep our program on a level playing field and do not discriminate between non DBE and DBE firms. Both are equally welcome to apply to our database and can expect equal treatment. We do not use fee based firms specializing only in Out Reach to DBE's., because it would be discriminatory to non DBE firms and it is unclear how much impact, if any, fee based Outreach Firms could have on our specialized market. With DBE participation in our program currently at a reasonable level compared to the State Department of Transportation, the cost of additional outreach is unwarranted.

D. Local Market

The market for the specialized studies we perform is, at a minimum, state wide. Some of the firms we use have international central offices with localized branch offices in California or Fresno. However, we do not restrict our procurement activities to large firms. We consistently do business with small firms possessing the specific qualifications required. In fact, many of our procurements for specialized studies require a broad background of expertise so the process naturally lends itself to various small, medium, and large firms teaming up to pool their diverse talents to secure a contract, hence unbinding large contacts into smaller parts.

E. Apples to Apples

We include only DBE and non DBE firms registered in our data base to make our Step One calculation. And while we have a variety of planning studies subject to the DBE program, the nature of these studies are consistent from year to year. Here is a sample of the varieties of studies we may do.

F. Weighting

Weighting is an excellent method of subdividing a goal between various NAICS codes, however all the consultants in our data base are NAICS code 541 – Professional, Scientific, and Technical, so we have no need to weight our overall goal.

G. Decertification

If a DBE firm is decertified or goes out of business we will delete them from the data base when we do our annual update to insure the firm is not included in the numerator or denominator of our Step One calculation.

H. Adjustment based on Federal Assistance

Our estimate of available DBE's is based on the firms registered in our data base. We do not make adjustments to the goal based on the level of federal funding we expect to receive from any program from year to year.

I. Other methods

Over the years our data base has matured to contain the firms that are qualified and wish to compete in our procurement program. Our method of using a bidders list is the best reflection of anticipated DBE participation and it is unlikely other methods to measure the relative availability of DBE's would provide the same focus for our specific market or as consistent results.

III. Step Two.

In order to make our goal as precise as possible we adjust it for all information available in our jurisdiction. The most relevant factor we consider to adjust our goal is current capacity to do work as measured by the volume of work DBE's have performed in recent years. We also take into consideration a disparity study done in 2016 by the State Department of Transportation, however the DOT study focus is primarily construction and engineering. Our emphasis is

primarily planning. We do not adjust for financing, bonding, or union affiliation as these requirements are applicable to construction projects, not planning studies, and while we don't adjust the goal for insurance, we have worked with small firms to structure our contract to minimize the exorbitant cost of professional liability requirements.

A. Adjustment based on Past Participation

1. Previous Non compliance

Per 26.47, falling short of achieving the adopted DBE goal does not represent non compliance as long as the DBE program is implemented in good faith. Fresno COG's previous results are reasonable when compared to the State Department of Transportation utilization and we continue to implement our DBE program in good faith, however if over the three year program our results were to become considerably over are under the adopted goal a detailed analysis of the reasons for the difference between the overall goal and the results would be conducted. We can't predict what that analysis might foretell but we can speculate that in either case, over or under, we may have to more closely examine our data base to test the validity of the initial assumptions that went into creating the adopted goal. We could also speculate if the goal were to fall significantly short of expectations we may need to consider implementing race conscious measures or requesting the board appropriate a budget to increase DBE outreach. If the goal were to significantly exceed expectations, we would have to examine our procurement selection process to verify our actual procurement practices were narrowly tailored to address instances of discrimination.

2. Adjustment for Previous participation

Our actual experience over a five year period is fairly consistent when the high years and low years are discounted. The mathematical methodology to accomplish this is to develop a median distribution and adjust for the median.

3. Decertification

There are no decertified firms in the numerator or denominator of our base year calculation. We annually recalculate the goal each year based on the number of active firms and DBE's remaining in the data base after deleting non active firms. This annual interim adjustment is not required by regulations but we feel it makes for a more accurate estimate of the availability of DBE firms willing and able to participate in our program.

4. Similarity of Contracts

As discussed above in I.E. the contracts we engage in each year are consistent and represent a valid reflection of the type of work DBE's may perform for us, therefore a year by year comparison of goal results is applicable.

5. a Determining the past median.

Our previous results over the last five years have been.

2012/13	15.8%
2013/14	9.%
2014/15	12%
2015/16	13%
2016/17	34%

When put in a median distribution, the mean year of is 13%, therefor we will use it to adjust our three year 2015/16 - 2017/18 Step One calculation.

5.b Median Adjustment

Step one Base 15.61% plus median 13% = 28.61% 28.61% divided by 2 = 14.31%

6. Years of past participation

Five years of past participation is good to develop the median adjustment, because there are two years evenly on each side of the median.

7. Decreased Goal

The adjustment decreased our goal slightly, however the intent was not to decrease the goal, but to make it as accurate as possible. The adjustment could have just as easily increased the base calculation.

8. First Year Program.

This is not applicable to our program.

B. Other Factors

1. Additional Sources

In determining whether or not it is appropriate to adjust for prior discrimination, we went to Caltrans Office of Business and Economic Opportunity website where DBE's can register in the California Unified Certification program (UCP) or one can search the state database for a DBE using a variety of search criteria. The US Department of Transportation also has a comprehensive website providing information on regulations and compliance with the federal statutes including a search list for decertified DBE's. This useful information on program implementation and compliance included no specific information to indicate an adjustment should be warranted to our goal to address prior discrimination.

2. Disparity Studies

In 2012 the State Department of Transportation did a disparity study that revealed statistically significant underutilization of six groups, African American, Asian Pacific American, Native American, Women, Hispanic Males and Subcontinent Asian Males. The Federal Highway Administration approved the State Department of Transportation's Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program on the basis of this disparity study and these underutilized groups became the standard for reporting DBE experience on the Uniform Report of DBE Commitments/Awards and Payments format used by Federal Transit Administration and Caltrans. In 2016 Caltrans updated the study and found that three of the groups, Black American, Hispanic American, and Native American exhibited disparity indices substantially below parity, two groups, Women and Subcontinent Asian American were slightly below parity, and Asian Pacific American did not exhibit disparity between participation and availability. The study also proposed Caltrans could raise their Step One base goal to 17.6% to account for barriers minorities face in the California market place, but also suggested a downward Step Two adjustment may be appropriate to reflect the median utilization of 10.7% for the years 2011-2015 which would yield a proposed goal of 14.1%. The analysis also noted during the study period Caltrans actual utilization decreased to 7.2% thus validating a potential Step Two adjustment yielding a potential 12.4% overall goal. In light of the fact that our proposed goal, adjusted for utilization is 14.31% we propose no further adjustment at this time, however in light of Caltrans declining utilization we will watch our own actual DBE utilization closely and consider an appropriate adjustment when putting together the three year plan for 2018/19 - 2020/21.

3. Local Market Characteristics

We have general information regarding the size, age, and expertise of many of the firms in our data base, however do not use that information to make further adjustment to our Step Two goal because in order to be fair we would have to compete a costly and technically complicated evaluation of each firm in the data base.

4. Additional Information

We are satisfied the information previously discussed provides the best methodology for establishing our goal.

IV. Race Neutral / Race Conscious

Per 26.51 we are required to meet the maximum feasible portion of our goal using Race Neutral methodology. Our overall goal is 100% race neutral and 0% race conscious. Our five year record of reasonable DBE participation using 100% race neutral measures reinforces continued usage of the 100% race neutral methodology. However we reserve the option to apply race conscious measures if applicable.

Part of our good faith effort implementation of the DBE Program, includes the active implementation to foster small business participation. Our contracting requirements are structured to facilitate competition by small businesses, and we take all reasonable steps to eliminate obstacles to their participation, including unnecessary and unjustified bundling of contract requirements that may preclude small business participation as prime contractors or subcontractors. A reasonable number of prime contracts shall be of a size that small businesses, including DBEs, can reasonably perform.

Our procurement program is open to all small businesses, including DBEs, regardless of their location, and there are no limits on the number of contracts that can be awarded. Every effort will be made to avoid creating barriers. Assistance is provided to small business, including DBEs, in overcoming barriers to participation in all methods of procurement. Fresno COG staff shall offer the following assistance to DBEs and other small businesses:

Information on its organization and contractual needs;

Instructions for preparation of bid specifications, procurement policy procedures, and general bid requirements;

Information on specific reasons for unsuccessful bids through debriefing sessions;

Projected procurement opportunities; Instruction of job performance requirements

WHEREAS, COG reserves the right to use Race Neutral and Race Conscious Measures to meet DBE goals per the State Department of Transportation's evidence of discrimination, and proposes setting the 2015/16-2017/18 DBE Goal at 15.65% to be met with some combination of Race Conscious or Race Neutral means, and

WHEREAS, COG updates the goal annually to reflect changes in participation rates, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the COG adopts the 2015-16 through 2017-18 DBE goal at 15.65% to be applied in federally assisted contract awards.

Mayor Dhaliwal (San Joaquin) Chair, called the meeting to order at 5:55 p.m. following the Fresno County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Agency meeting.

I. TRANSPORTATION CONSENT ITEMS

About Consent Items:

as part of the Outreach Plan and Community Workshops requirements, they have held several Public Meetings with the first one being in the City of Huron and the second one in Lemoore during the month of May. The remaining public meeting was held during the June Policy Board meeting.

The purpose of the public meetings is to provide an overview of the project scope/schedule, context of the Plan, economic overview (socioeconomic growth trends and agricultural/food processing trends); and Goods Movement overview relating to, current and future truck traffic forecasts, regional economy, goods movement customers/suppliers, and objectives of corridor improvements. A corridor analysis was provided, including Base Year information for non-drought and non-recession conditions, future traffic forecasts, roadway capacity analysis, accident analysis and roadway improvement recommendations. The presentation included information on the ultimate goal and configuration of the Plan including performance measures and metrics.

There was a brief discussion regarding need for passing lanes, fog/dust storm markers and 198/269 aqueduct signal. Mayor Knight (Firebaugh) asked how roundabouts are working in the rural areas.

Mayor Dhaliwal opened the Public Hearing.

Patrick Smith, Harris Ranch briefly commented on safety concerns.

There being no other comments, the Public Hearing was closed.

The Consolidated Transportation Service Agency's (CTSA) Operations Program and Budget (OPB), FY 2015-16 for the Fresno Urban and Rural CTSA is available on the Fresno COG website at: http://fresnocog.org. F. PUBLIC HEARING - Unmet Transit Needs Report Resolution 2015-16 [Long] [APPROVE]

Jeff Long (FCOG/FAX) presented this item noting that the Fresno COG Policy Board must determine that public transportation needs within Fresno County will be reasonably met in Fiscal Year 2015-16 prior to approving claims of Local Transportation Funds for streets and roads. The Fresno COG's Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) is responsible for evaluating unmet transit needs. Each year the SSTAC begins the process of soliciting comments from the public by sending approximately 400 letters to agencies and individuals interested in providing feedback on their public transportation needs within Fresno County. The request for comments letters, English and Spanish, were sent on February 7, 2015.

In addition to the request for written comments, SSTAC held three information-gathering meetings.

The first outreach meeting was held in the City of Huron, on February 17, 2015, in the City Hall Council Chambers at 36311 Lassen Ave., Huron, CA 93234. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Western Fresno county including: Coalinga, Firebaugh, Huron, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The second meeting was held in the City of Clovis on February 18, 2015 in the Clovis Senior Activity Center at 850 4th Street, Clovis, CA 93612. The location was selected to facilitate comments from the residents of the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA) and surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The final outreach meeting was held in the City of Selma, on February 19, 2015, in the City Council Chambers at 1710 Tucker Street, Selma, CA 93662. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Eastern Fresno county including: Fowler, Kingsburg, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, Selma, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. One comment was received regarding staffing on the intercity bus passing through Selma in route to the City of Fresno. Gary Joseph, FEOC Manager and operator of this service responded to the inquiry. This issued was not related to Unmet Needs.

The SSTAC Chairman received two (2) letters and one (1) email regarding perceived "Unmet Transit Needs". Copies of the actual letters and Staff response are attached to this Report. They are summarized as follows:

- 1. The first comment letter was from the County of Fresno Public Works Department, concerning service in the southeast part of Fresno.
- 2. The second comment email came from Mr. David F. Rodriguez, Senior Deputy County Counsel, regarding service to the Juvenile Justice Campus.

A motion was made by Councilmember Beck (Reedley) and seconded by Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove) to approve Resolution 2015-15 adopting Fresno COG's 2015-16 through 2017-18 Annual Anticipated DBE Participation Level at 15.65%. A vote was called for and the motion carried.

H. Scope of Work for Needs Assessment Program [Cai] [APPROVE]

Kristine Cai (FCOG) presented this item, noting that in May of 2014, the Fresno COG Policy Board directed COG staff to work on three Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) implementation programs: Needs Assessment, Sustainable Planning and Infrastructure Grant Program and Agriculture Mitigation program. The mission of the Needs Assessment program was to conduct a county-wide transportation needs assessment and evaluate such needs in Fresno County's disadvantaged communities.

Launched in November 2014, the Needs Assessment Committee, which consisted of staff members from the cities and the County as well as representatives of community groups, went through 6 months of intensive discussion and debate about what is desired and what can be realistically achieved through the Needs Assessment program. Under the leadership of the City of Clovis Council member Lynne Ashbeck, the Needs Assessment Committee developed a definition for "Disadvantaged Communities" in Fresno County, and reached consensus on the scope of work for the Needs Assessment program. The following is a summary of the scope recommended by the Needs Assessment Committee:

- 1. Collect ADA (or sidewalk) plans and bike plans from the cities and the County
- 2. Build an inventory of existing sidewalks and bike/trail facility based on the data/plans from the cities and the County; create a GIS database for planned bike & pedestrian facilities
- 3. For cities or jurisdictions that do not have such existing data, contract with Fresno State's Community and Regional Planning Center(CRPC) to fill the data gap using Google Earth
- 4. Overlay the sidewalk/bike inventory maps with transit stops
- 5. Collect health related data, and overlay the health data map with sidewalk, bike/trail and transit stop maps
- 6. Overlay sidewalk, bike/trail and transit stop maps with the Disadvantaged Communities map
- 7. Contract with a consulting firm to conduct:
- A regional gap analysis for bike and trail facilities (sidewalk is not included in the analysis because sidewalks are considered local)
- A transportation connectivity/accessibility analysis for 10 major regional facilities that provide basic services to the public. All modes (roads and streets, transit, bike/ped) are included in this analysis

Following an expressed opportunity for public comment, a motion was made by Mayor Magsig (Clovis) and seconded by Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove) to approve the scope of work for the Needs Assessment program. A vote was called for and the motion carried.

I. Local Labor Hiring Process Pilot Program [Chargin/Garza] [INFORMATION]

Lindsey Chargin (FCOG) presented this item. On March 3, 2015, U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx announced a proposal for a new pilot program that will explore new ways to make it easier for states and cities to promote the hiring of local residents to work on local transportation construction projects. A March 6, 2015 Federal Register Notice formally announced that the Federal Highway

V. ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION / DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Senate Bill 16 [Boren] [INFORMATION]

Tony Boren, Executive Director noted that Senate Bill 16, authored by Senator Jim Beall of San Jose is an urgency bill that would increase several taxes and fees to raise roughly \$3.5 billion in new transportation revenues annually for five years with the funding used to address deferred maintenance on the state highways and local streets and roads. Specifically, this bill imposes the following:

- 1. A \$0.10 per gallon excise tax on gasoline
- 2. A \$0.12 per gallon excise tax on diesel
- 3. An increase in vehicle license fees and registration fees for five years
 - 1. VLF: for non-commercial vehicles, 0.07% each year so that the VLF is 1.00% by July 1, 2019; and
 - 2. VRF: \$35 per vehicle plus an additional \$100 for zero-emission vehicles.



the Kerman Community/Teen Center, the location was selected to facilitate comments from the residents of Western Fresno county including: Coalinga, Firebaugh, Huron, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The final outreach meeting was held in the City of Parlier, on February 18, 2016, to facilitate comments from the residents of Eastern Fresno county including: Fowler, Kingsburg, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, Selma, and the surrounding unincorporated communities.

The SSTAC Chairman received four (4) written comments regarding perceived "Unmet Transit Needs". These came in the form of emails and written correspondence. Copies of the actual emails and letters, and Staff response are attached to this Report. They are summarized as follows:

- 1. The first comment was received from the Karan Dhillon, T.I.L.E Counselor at Fresno City College, concerning potential students residing in Madera County accessing the T.I.L.E. program in Fresno.
- 2. The second comment letter was from Robert J. Hand, Executive Director of Resources for Independence Central Valley, regarding direct bus service to Inspiration Park in the City of Fresno.
- 3. The third comment letter came from Ms. Leticia Corona, Community Advocacy Director from the Leadership Counsel for Justice and Accountability. Ms Corona had a number of issues that fall under basic operations, but there were three items that pertained to unmet needs; 1) service to Clovis Community College, 2) discounted passes for low-income students and 3) bus shelters at Jane Adams Elementary School.
- 4. The 4th comment letter was from Dr. Samuel Morgan, the new Executive Director of Resources for Independence Central Valley, regarding direct bus service to Inspiration Park in the City of Fresno.

After thorough review of all items, the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) found there to be no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet in Fresno County.

Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove) commented that the City of Orange Cove had no unmet needs and was satisfied with the service being provided.

Following an expressed opportunity for public comment, a motion to approve Resolution 2016-15 making the finding that there are no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet in Fresno County was made by Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove), and seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Yep (Kerman). A vote was called for and the motion carried.

D. PUBLIC HEARING: Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) Report, Resolution 2016-12 (Les Beshears) [APPROVE]

Mr. Beshears (FCOG) reported that the U.S. Department of Transportation requires a 3 year program for the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program. A California State Department of Transportation Availability and Disparity Study revealed statistically significant underutilization of six groups (African American, Asian Pacific American, Native American, Women, Hispanic Males and Subcontinent Asian Males) presumed to be disadvantaged as defined in 49, CFR Part 26. The Federal Highways Administration (FHWA) has approved the California State Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program on the basis of this the Disparity Study. Each year, Fresno COG staff mailed a notice to our entire consulting database advising them of the requirements and requesting updates to their DBE status. The result of their response has been tabulated and our database now has 313 companies of which two are African American, five are Asian Pacific American, two are Native American, nineteen are women, eleven are Hispanic Male, five are Subcontinent Asian Male and 1 is Other, reflecting a 14.38% over all anticipated DBE Participation Level.

A public notice was placed in the Fresno Bee on May 29, 2016, noticing this public hearing and inviting interested parties of the Fresno Council of Governments DBE program public hearing on June 30, 2016.

The 2016-17 Overall work program and budget identifies \$895,000 in contracting opportunities that will be subject to procurement during the fiscal year.

The Pilot Project kicked off in April 2015 and was effectively managed through Fresno COG's Congestion Management Process (CMP). The CMP Steering Committee has meetings regularly to discuss project-related planning and technical issues.

Over the past year, FCOG received guidance and technical support from FHWA and the technical team FHWA assembled together for this pilot program. The pilot project was well-received by local agencies and higher education institutes. Five local agencies (cities and county) and Fresno State University participated in the program.

Through the pilot program, Fresno COG purchased four pairs of PYRO Box and TUBE counters, one of which is directional and the rest non-directional. Collectively by May 2016, the agencies and university have collected four months' worth of bike and pedestrian data covering 23 locations ranging from suburban multi-use trails, and university campus to downtown pedestrian mall. In-depth analyses were performed on the collected data by the university students and local agency staff.

After the one-year pilot project phase, Fresno COG will keep the equipment and have them available to local agencies. The CMP committee will discuss how best we can utilize the equipment after the pilot program is completed. Discussions are already underway for conducting more counts and funding the automated data retrieval process. Conducting bike and pedestrian counts is new to this region. This pilot program provides a unique opportunity for local agencies and transportation planning community to get familiar with the state-of-the-art technologies and engage in the active transportation field with more accountable.

This item is informational only and required no further action.

H. Caltrans Report (CALTRANS)

Ms. Miller (Caltrans) provided an update on the SR 99 work and upcoming closure related to High Speed Rail. The Jacalitos Creek Bridge Replacement Project was completed. The Maynard Munger Vista Point continues and will be closed to motorists. The Auberry Roundabout was awarded June 20th, construction will start at the end of the year. The 198 Aqueduct is on the CTC agenda for approval and will be completed by summer 2017.

Supervisor Perea (Fresno County) commended the work being done to clean up the freeway entrances.

Mr. Boren (FCOG) stated that FCOG received over \$920,000 in planning grants from the state and thanked Caltrans' staff for supporting the project applications.

Mayor Pro Tem Dhaliwal (San Joaquin) and Mayor Pro Tem Yep (Kerman) discussed the Kerman roundabout and the lessons learned. Mayor Pro Tem Yep (Kerman) urged other cities to thoroughly review issues such as who is responsible for maintenance, drainage to landscape. Major concerns were related to the aprons used to slow down truck traffic were ineffective and the traffic analysis did not consider traffic during heaving fog or harvest season.

Ms. Miller (Caltrans) responded that Kerman's roundabout was the first one done, there were many lesson learned to improve implementation moving forward.

This item is informational only and required no further action.

A motion to approve was made by Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove), and seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Yep (Kerman). A vote was called for and the motion carried.

V. ADMINISTRATIVE CONSENT ITEMS

Mr. Santoya stated that the application would be submitted in July 2017, the final feasibility report will be release in the next 60 days and working with legislatures to get federal congressional authorization for construction and appropriations. He estimates that after design, environmental and legal challenges are cleared; construction would start 10-12 at the earliest. The current estimated construction cost is about \$2.8B and does not anticipate a large inflation in construction cost.

He thanked Supervisor Perea and Supervisor Pacheco for the creation of the JPA.

Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove) commented that this effort took 12 years to get to this point.

VII. OTHER BUSINESS

- Mr. Boren announced the death of Ron Peterson, former director of FCTA.
