WHEREAS, California Public Utilities Code, Section 99401.5 requires that the Council of Fresno County Governments, as the regional transportation planning agency, determine definitions of "unmet transit needs" and "reasonable to meet" as the basis for consideration of Unmet Transit Needs Findings;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of Fresno County Governments hereby determines the following definitions:

Unmet Transit Needs

"Those public transportation or specialized transportation services that are identified in the Regional Transportation Plan and/or documented through the COFCG's annual unmet transit needs public hearing process that have not been implemented or funded."

Reasonable to Meet

"Those public transportation services identified in the Regional Transportation Plan, or proposed amendment thereto, which meet the following criteria:

- (1) Services which, if implemented or funded, would not cause the responsible operator or service claimant to exceed its appropriations limitation as set forth by Proposition 4 (Gann Limit).
- (2) Services which, if implemented or funded, would not cause the responsible operator to incur expenditures in excess of the maximum amount of:
 - (a) Local Transportation Funds and State Transit Assistance Funds which may be available for such operator to claim;
 - (b) Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) funds or other support for public transportation services which are committed by Federal and/or State agencies by formula or tentative approval of specific grant requests; and
 - (c) Farebox and local funding in compliance with PUC Section 99268 et.seg.

The fact that an identified need cannot fully be met based on available resources, however, shall not be the sole reason for finding that a transit need is not reasonable to meet.

Services which, if implemented or funded, would (3) result in the responsible operator or service claimant meeting the farebox recovery and local support requirements as set forth by PUC Section 99268 et. seq. Evaluation of existing operators shall be based on records provided to COFCG by operators pursuant to the Transit Productivity Evaluation Process (PUC Section 99244).

Evaluation of proposed new service shall be based upon a feasibility analysis which includes, but is not limited to:

- Forecast of anticipated ridership if service (a) is provided.
- Estimate of capital and operating costs for (b) the provision of such services.
- Estimate of fares and local support in relation to estimated operating costs for providing such services.
- (d) An estimated fare which the COFCG Board would determine to be sufficient to meet farebox recovery requirements, but would not be so high that it would pose a financial burden on transit dependent patrons.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these definitions remain in effect until such time a change is warranted.

WHEREAS, the California Public Utilities Code, Section 99401.5 requires that the transportation planning agency hold a public hearing and make a determination that there are no unmet transportation needs within its jurisdiction which can be reasonably met before claims for Local Transportation Funds for streets and roads may be approved; and

WHEREAS, the Fresno Council of Governments (Fresno COG) in compliance with Section 99401.5, defines unmet public transportation needs as those public transportation or specialized transportation services that are identified in the Regional Transportation Plan and/or documented through the Fresno COG's Annual Unmet Transit Needs Public Hearing Process that have not been implemented or funded.

WHEREAS, the Fresno COG Board, after consultation with its Social Services Transportation Advisory Council, held such public hearing on June 25, 2015 and received testimony from all interested persons; and

WHEREAS, the complete report contains responses delivered to all comments received during the information gathering meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Cities of Fresno and Clovis will provide fixed route transit service in accordance with Federal and State and also will provide demand-responsive public transportation service to the general public, elderly and disabled residents within its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the following jurisdictions are members of the Fresno County Rural Transit Agency (FCRTA) and provide service under contract with that joint powers agency: Coalinga, Firebaugh, Fowler, Huron, Kerman, Kingsburg, Mendota, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, San Joaquin, Sanger, Selma and Fresno County; and

WHEREAS, such contracts for service and direct service results in the delivery of public transportation service within Fresno COG's jurisdiction and is in conformance with and satisfies the service requirements of the adopted Regional Transportation Plan for Fresno County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Fresno Council of Governments, pursuant to California Public Utilities Code Section 99401.5(d,2), finds for each of the following entities that there are no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet: Clovis, Coalinga, Firebaugh, Fowler, Fresno, Huron, Kerman, Kingsburg, Mendota, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, San Joaquin, Sanger, Selma and Fresno County.

6. Disadvantaged Business Enterprises

The Fresno Council of Governments, in accordance with 49 CFR Part 26, adopts a triennial disadvantaged business enterprise (DBE) goal to apply in Fresno COG awarded contracts funded with federal or state grants. On June 25, 2015, in public hearing, the Fresno COG Policy Board will adopt Resolution 2015-15 setting the three year goal for 2015-16 through 2017-18. The triennial DBE goal takes into consideration a Disparity Shudy done by the state Department of Transportation. Per the state and federal Departments of Transportation, six groups are presumed to be disadvantaged. African American, Asian Pacific American, Native American, Women, Hispanic and Subcontinent Asian Males. The goal applies to a variety of technical transportation and air quality related studies, Federal Highways, and Federal Transit Administration programs flemized in the Fresno COG 2015/16 Overall Work Program and budget.

Any firm with technical qualifications to perform these studies may apply to be added to Fresno COG's RFP listing, Firms wishing to qualify as a DBE must provide a current certification in compliance with 49 CFR Part 26, issued by the State of California, Department of Transportation, the National Economic Development Administration, the City of Fresno, the County of Fresno or some other certifying governmental agency.

The Fresno Council of Governments (Fresno COG), as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency, is responsible for annually ensuring that public transportation needs are being "reasonably met". Each year the Fresno COG conducts an extensive process to plan, program, and evaluate existing and potential general public and social service transit services within Fresno County.

The Fresno COG's Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) was established to address transit issues within Fresno County. It is composed of a broad representation of social service agencies, transit operators and users, and is responsible for forwarding recommendations to the Fresno COG Policy Board regarding transit needs and issues.

As part of the annual process to identify possible unmet transit needs within Fresno County, we invite individuals and organizations such as you, to contribute comments. If you are aware of a specific transit need that is not currently being met by one of the existing general public, social service or private sector operators, we request that you submit information regarding any unmet transit needs to assist staff in evaluating the potential for additional transit service. In order to evaluate potential services, we are asking you to provide as much information as possible. The specific information that will be most helpful includes:

- > Where new service is needed, and where the potential trips would start and end;
- > When and how often trips would need to be scheduled;
- A description of the individuals needing the service including age group, financial constraints, and whether they have disabilities requiring special services.

The information will be used by the SSTAC to evaluate potential new services before it makes a determination and recommendation regarding "unmet transit needs" to the Fresno COG Policy Board prior to its public hearing on this matter. The public hearing will be held on June 25, 2015 during the Fresno COG Policy Board Meeting.

RECCOMENDATION

It is recommended the Fresno Council of Governments Policy Board find that there are no unmet public transportation needs, which are reasonable to meet within the County of Fresno.

DISCUSSION

On June 25, 2015, the Fresno Council of Governments (Fresno COG), as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for Fresno County, will hold a legally noticed Public Hearing. The purpose of the hearing is to receive public testimony to determine if public transportation needs within Fresno County will be reasonably met in Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-2016 (July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016), prior to approving claims of Local Transportation Funds (LTF) for streets and roads. The time and place of the Public Hearing have been legally noticed as follows:

Date: June 25, 2015 Time: 5:30 p.m.

Place: Fresno Council of Governments, Sequoia Room

2035 Tulare St., Suite 201 Fresno, California 93721-2004 Transportation Development Act (TDA) - Local Transportation Funds are derived from the State Sales Tax. Of the State's portion of the sales tax revenue, 1/4 of a cent goes to the Local Transportation Fund and may be used for transportation projects. In FY 2015-2016, the estimated Local Transportation Funds for Fresno County are \$32,000,000, of which \$100,000 is programmed for administration and audits, and \$890,967 is programmed for regional transportation planning. Table-1 identifies the amount of project funding each local agency will receive in FY 2015-2016.

Of the Local Transportation Funds available for public transportation and streets and roads, priority must first be given to public transportation, the net difference is then available for street and road projects.

Pursuant to Section 99401.5 of the California Public Utilities Code, Fresno COG, as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency, must make a finding after holding a Public Hearing that there are no unmet public transportation needs within the jurisdiction of claimants which can be reasonably met before it may approve Local Transportation Fund claims for streets and roads.

DEFINITATION OF "UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS," AND "NEEDS THAT ARE REASONABLE TO MEET"

Section 99401.5(c) of the California Public Utilities Code specifies, "The transportation planning agency shall determine its definitions of the terms 'unmet transit needs' and 'reasonable to meet' for the purposes of this section which shall be documented by resolution or within the minutes of the agency."

The Fresno COG defined these terms by Resolution 1990-15 as follows:

A. Unmet Transit Needs

"Those public transportation or specialized transportation services that are identified in the Regional Transportation Plan and/or documented through the Fresno COG's Annual Unmet Transit Needs Public Hearing Process that have not been implemented or funded."

B. Reasonable to Meet

"Those public transportation services identified in the Regional Transportation Plan, or proposed amendment thereto, which meet the following criteria:"

- (1) Services which, if implemented or funded, would not cause the responsible operator or service claimant to exceed its appropriations limitation as set forth by Proposition 4 (Gann Limit)
- (2) Services which, if implemented or funded, would not cause the responsible operator to incur expenditures in excess of the maximum amount of:
 - (a) Local Transportation Funds and State Transit Assistance Funds which may be available for such operator to claim;
 - (b) Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds or other support for public transportation services which are committed by Federal and/or State agencies by formula or tentative approval of specific grant requests; and
 - (c) Farebox and local funding in compliance with PUC Section 99268 et.seq.

The fact that an identified need cannot fully be met based on available resources shall not be the sole reason for finding a transit need is not reasonable to meet.

(3) Services which, if implemented or funded, would result in the responsible operator or service claimant meeting the farebox recovery and local support requirements as set forth by PUC Section 99268 et. seq. Evaluation of existing operators shall be based on records provided to Fresno COG by operators pursuant to the Transit Productivity Evaluation Process (PUC Section 99244)

Evaluation of proposed new service shall be based upon a feasibility analysis, which includes, but is not limited to:

- (a) Forecast of anticipated ridership if service is provided;
- (b) Estimate of capital and operating costs for the provision of such services;
- (c) Estimate of fares and local support in relation to estimated operating costs for providing such services; and
- (d) An estimated fare, which the Fresno COG Board would determine to be sufficient to meet farebox recovery requirements, but would not be so high it would pose a financial burden on transit dependent patrons.

SOCIAL SERVICES TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COUNCIL (SSTAC)

The Fresno COG Policy Board established its Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) on May 26, 1988, to aid in its review of transit issues with emphasis on the annual identification of transit needs within Fresno County. These needs include the needs of transit dependent and transit disadvantaged persons, including the elderly, disabled, and persons of limited means. The Fresno COG's establishment of this Advisory Council is consistent with State Law (SB 498, Chapter 673, 1987), which mandates both the purpose and minimum membership of this body. A list of SSTAC members is included with this report (Attachment A).

The purpose of the SSTAC is to:

- (1) Annually participate in identification of transit needs (Unmet Transit Needs Public Hearing Process)
- (2) Review and recommend appropriate action by the Fresno COG for a jurisdiction which finds by resolution, that:
 - (a) There are no unmet transit needs;

- (b) There are no unmet transit needs, which are reasonable to meet:
- (c) There are unmet transit needs, which are reasonable to meet.
- (3) Advise the Fresno COG on any other major transit issues, including the coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.

SSTAC UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS PROCESS

The SSTAC has developed an annual process for soliciting unmet transit need comments from the public. Over 400 letters are sent to agencies and individuals interested in providing feedback on their public transportation needs within Fresno County (Attachments B-1, B-2 and B-3). The letter was prepared in English and Spanish versions, and included a request for information regarding any unmet transit needs within Fresno County. Respondents were requested to include the following information to assist Staff in an initial evaluation of proposed services:

- Where new service is needed, and where the potential trips would start and end;
- When, and how often trips would need to be scheduled; and
- A description of the individuals needing the service including age group, financial constraints, and whether they have disabilities requiring special services.

As part of the information gathering process, SSTAC held three (3) public outreach meetings (Attachment C) to seek Unmet Transit Needs comments from residents throughout the County.

The first outreach meeting was held in the City of Huron, on February 17, 2015, in the City Hall Council Chambers at 36311 Lassen Ave., Huron, CA 93234. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Western Fresno county including: Coalinga, Firebaugh, Huron, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The second meeting was held in the City of Clovis on February 18, 2015 in the Clovis Senior Activity Center at 850 4th Street, Clovis, CA 93612. The location was selected to facilitate comments from the residents of the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA) and surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The final outreach meeting was held in the City of Selma, on February 19, 2015, in the City Council Chambers at 1710 Tucker Street, Selma, CA 93662. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Eastern Fresno county including: Fowler, Kingsburg, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, Selma, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. One comment was received regarding staffing on the intercity bus passing through Selma in route to the City of Fresno. Gary Joseph, FEOC Manager and operator of this service responded to the inquiry. This issued was not related to Unmet Needs.

THE SSTAC'S COMMENTS REGARDING SUBMITTED "UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS" REQUESTS

The SSTAC Chairman received three (3) letters regarding perceived "Unmet Transit Needs". Copies of the actual letters and Staff response are attached to this Report. They are summarized as follows:

- 1. The first comment was received from Mr. Mohammad Alimi with the County of Fresno Department of Public Works and Planning. Mr. Alimi's comments were for an expansion of services to the southeast and increase frequencies to the area.
- 2) The second comment letter came from Mr. David F. Rodriguez, Senior Deputy County Counsel, regarding service to the Juvenile Justice Campus.
- 3) The final comment letter came from Mr. Tom Gaffery from Fresno State University, concerning service in the area of the University and El Dorado Park.

Each of the actual comment letters and Staff response letters are contained in the Fresno COG's "Unmet Transit Needs" Staff report, Attachment D, which is forwarded to the SSTAC for review, comment and recommendations.

The Fresno COG's Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) will continue to be involved in determining appropriate Staff responses. Other proposals may yet be presented at the Fresno COG's Annual Unmet Transit Needs Public Hearing scheduled for 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 25, 2015. After adoption, other amendments may be funded with available contingency funds.

To fulfill their role in making a recommendation to forward onto the Fresno COG Advisory Committees (TTC/PAC) and ultimately to the Fresno COG Policy Board, the SSTAC (following an expressed opportunity for public comment) made the following recommendation, based on its May 19, 2015 findings:

In consideration of these actions, and in reference to the contents of the Fresno COG's Regional Transportation Plan and supporting implementation documents, specifically:

- The Short Range Transit Plan for the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area, 2016-2020:
- The Short Range Transit Plan for the Rural Fresno County Area, 2016-2020;
- The Consolidated Transportation Service Agency's (CTSA) Operations Program and Budget 2015-2016 for the Fresno Urban CTSA, the Clovis CTSA and the Fresno County Rural CTSA; and
- The Fresno County Rural Transit Agency's 2015-2016 Budget.

Pending additional public testimony at the legally noticed Public Hearing scheduled before the Fresno COG's Policy Board on June 25, 2015, the SSTAC hereby has reached the following conclusion:

The voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION PLAN SUMMARY

A. Overview

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) for public transportation services contains a Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA) component, a Fresno County Rural component, and a Social Service Transportation component. The Metropolitan Area component is actualized through the "Short-Range Transit Plan (FCMA SRTP) for the Fresno-Clovis Urbanized Area July 2015 - June 2020" and is scheduled to be adopted on June 25, 2015 at the Fresno COG Board Meeting. It analyzes the metropolitan transit service needs and provides a detailed service plan for implementation over a five (5) year period. The Rural Area component is actualized through the "Short-Range Transit Plan (Rural SRTP) for the Fresno County Rural Area 2016-2020" and is scheduled to be adopted on June 25, 2015 at the Fresno COG Board Meeting. It analyzes rural transit service needs, and provides a detailed service plan for implementation over a five-year period.

In addition to these Short-Range Transit Plans for public transportation, the Fresno COG annually adopts an Operations Program and Budget for the coordination and consolidation of transportation for specialized social service programs within Fresno County. The 2015 - 2016 "Operations Program and Budget for the Fresno CTSA, the Clovis CTSA, and the Rural CTSA" is scheduled for adoption on June 25, 2015.

It must be emphasized, in order to "reasonably meet transit needs," it is necessary to satisfy the planned service requirements documented by the Regional Transportation Plan components described above (Administrative Code Section 6656). Further, State law (Administrative Code Section 6651) prescribes that expenditure of Local Transportation Funds must be in conformance with the Regional Transportation Plan. Fresno COG's Legal Counsel has interpreted these two (2) State law requirements as establishing what must be done (i.e., implement the planned transit service as contained in the Regional Transportation Plan) and what must not be done (i.e., do not provide transit service where it is *not* recommended by the Plan).

These dual requirements may appear inconsistent to individuals and organizations who believe there may be needs for service in areas of Fresno County where the Regional Transportation Plan does not now propose service, or where less service is proposed than they would desire. The inconsistencies are overcome through a continuous transportation planning process. Those who testify an unmet transit need does exist can be assured either their desired service has previously been analyzed and found to be unreasonable to meet, or their proposal will be evaluated to determine if it will be reasonable to amend the Plan and provide the desired service.

B. Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA)

The Regional Transportation Plan calls for fixed-route service within the Metropolitan Area to be provided by the City of Fresno's Fresno Area Express (FAX), with financial participation from the City of Clovis and Fresno County for service to non-Fresno City residents within FAX's Service Area. Demand responsive Handy-Ride service is provided through FAX under contract with Keolis Transit America. The Short-Range Transit Plan for the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area sets forth the specific service implementation plan for the five (5) fiscal year period of July 2015 to June 2020. It is this Short-Range Transit Plan (SRTP) that actualizes the more general service goals and objectives of the Regional Transportation Plan. The FCMA SRTP is scheduled to be adopted on June 25, 2015.

The Regional Transportation Plan and the FCMA Short-Range Transit Plan also continue to emphasize specialized service for disabled and elderly residents who are unable to utilize the fixed-route buses.

The estimated cost for operation of FAX in FY 2015-2016 is \$49.4 million. Service will be funded with \$22.6 million in State Transportation Development Act - Local Transportation Funds. FAX is also anticipating \$9.5 million in Measure C, and an additional \$7.0 million will be funded by the Federal Transit Administration. The remaining funds are derived from farebox revenues and special services provided under contracts with outside agencies such as the City of Clovis, Fresno County, and Valley Children's Hospital. Although the City of Fresno does not propose to expend any Local Transportation Funds on streets and roads in FY 2016, a "transit needs finding", is necessary to be consistent with SB-498. SB-498 states the lack of available resources shall *not* be the sole reason for finding a transit need is *not* reasonable to meet.

The City of Clovis operates two types of public transit service. Clovis Stageline provides general public fixed-route service within the City Limits. Clovis Round Up operates specialized demand-responsive service for the elderly and disabled residents. The City of Clovis has designated Round Up services as the Consolidated Transportation Services Agency (CTSA) for the Clovis Transit Service Area. The estimated cost for operation of Clovis Transit in FY 2015-2016 is \$4.9 million.

C. Rural Areas

The Regional Transportation Plan calls for service to rural portions of Fresno County, including intra-city service in and around thirteen (13) rural incorporated cities, two dozen unincorporated communities, and inter-city service linking those cities to the Fresno Metropolitan Area on the following corridors:

- (1) Firebaugh Mendota San Joaquin Kerman Corridor to Fresno
- (2) Kingsburg Selma Fowler Corridor to Fresno

- (3) Orange Cove Reedley Parlier Sanger Corridor to Fresno
- (4) Coalinga Huron Five Star Five Points Lanare Riverdale Caruthers Raisin City Easton Corridor to the Fresno

During the latter part of FY1978-1979 and the beginning of FY1979-1980, in cooperation with rural incorporated cities in Fresno County, Fresno COG prepared and adopted specific short-range transit development programs to define implementation of rural public transportation service in conformance with the Regional Transportation Plan. In September 1979, Fresno County Rural Transit Agency (FCRTA) was formed and assigned responsibility for implementing the service requirements of the Regional Transportation Plan as set forth by the Transit Development Programs. Services set forth by the Regional Transportation Plan and the Transit Development Programs were fully implemented by mid-February 1980.

A comprehensive Short-Range Transit Plan (Rural SRTP) for the Rural Fresno County Area, which updated the individual Transit Development Programs, was adopted on November 17, 1983. The five (5) year Rural SRTP is updated biannually. The latest update of the "Short-Range Transit Plan for the Rural Fresno County Area 2016-2020" is scheduled to be adopted on June 25, 2015. The estimated cost for the operation of the FCRTA in FY 2015-2016 is \$9,225,831. The Services will be funded with \$5,587,535 of State Transportation Development Act - (TDA) Local Transportation Funds (LTF). The FCRTA will utilize \$967,519 from its Measure – C funds to support the operations. An additional \$1,854,737 will be funded by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Farebox receipts are projected to be \$724,200 and Interest is estimated at \$91,840.

D. Social Service Transportation

The updated Social Service Transportation Action Plan and Inventory, was adopted January 29, 1998, and continues to co-designate the City of Fresno and the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC) as the Fresno Urban Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (CTSA). The Action Plan further designates City of Clovis, as the Clovis CTSA, and the Fresno County Rural Transit Agency (FCRTA) and the FEOC as the Fresno Rural Area CTSA. The Fresno COG has set aside each year, since FY1982-1983, five percent (5%) of Local Transportation Funds (Table 1) for social service transportation. An Operations Program and Budget (OPB) have been prepared for the Fresno Urban CTSA, Clovis CTSA, and the Fresno Rural CTSA. The FY2015-2016 OPB's, is scheduled for adoption on June 25, 2015, document commitments for matching funds from participating social service agencies and defines the types of coordinated/consolidated services to be provided so funds may be released.

Fresno County's CTSA process has been very successful in coordinating metropolitan and rural social service transportation needs. The Fresno COG's latest annual "Transit Productivity Report 2013-2014" indicates the CTSA's continue to provide a significant number of trips throughout Fresno County. An inventory of social service agencies was updated, as part of the development of the Fresno COG's Human Service Coordination Plan, as adopted January 29. 2015. It has assisted in determining if additional social service agencies may be interested in participating in the CTSA process.

Analysis of Proposed Public Transportation Services and Recommended Findings for Local Agencies FY 2015-2016

A. City of Clovis

The City of Clovis contributes funds to the operation of three (3) transit services within its jurisdiction. First, it operates the Clovis CTSA Round Up service on a demand-responsive basis to its elderly and disabled social service clients. Second, it operates Clovis Stageline to serve general public patrons with five (5) coordinated fixed routes; and third, it provides funding to Fresno Area Express (FAX) which operates fixed route service on Route 9 into Clovis.

Inter-city service to Fresno is available on Clovis CTSA's Round Up and Fresno Area Express / Handy-Ride.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Clovis will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained within the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

B. City of Coalinga

The City of Coalinga, under an inter-agency agreement with the FCRTA, provides intra-city and inter-city service using vehicles owned by the FCRTA. All FCRTA vehicles are lift equipped for elderly and disabled accessibility.

The Coalinga Transit intra-city demand responsive service operates with one (1) vehicle during an approximate eight (8) hour service period Monday through Friday.

Coalinga Transit also provides inter-city fixed route service, with route deviation to pick-up disabled passengers, between Coalinga and Fresno. The vehicle provides one (1) round trip through Pleasant Valley Prison, Huron, Five Points, Lanare, Riverdale, Caruthers, Raisin City, and Easton, during an approximate eleven (11) hour period, Monday through Saturday.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Coalinga, Sphere of Influence, and surrounding Area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

C. City of Firebaugh

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement with the City of Firebaugh continues to contract with Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC) as the Rural Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (Rural CTSA) for the provision of transportation services. Demand responsive service within Firebaugh's Sphere of Influence, and surrounding Area is available by a FCRTA's lift equipped vehicle, Monday through Friday for approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hours per day. A second vehicle is available for inter-city trips between Firebaugh and Mendota during an approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Westside Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Firebaugh, Mendota, San Joaquin and surrounding communities, Kerman, and "to" and "from" Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Firebaugh, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

D. City of Fowler

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement with the City of Fowler contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC) as the Rural Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (Rural CTSA) for the provision of transportation services within its Sphere of Influence and surrounding area. A lift equipped FCRTA vehicle is the community service the area, approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hours per day, Monday through Friday.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Southeast Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, for approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Kingsburg, Selma, and Fowler and "to" and "from" Fresno.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Fowler, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

E. City of Fresno

Fresno Area Express (FAX) provides fixed route service seven (7) days-a-week throughout the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area. The City of Clovis and Fresno County financially participate for service to non-Fresno City residents within Fresno Area Express' Service Area. Fresno Area Express contracts with Keolis Transit America for weekday and weekend demand-responsive service on Handy-Ride. This service is oriented toward those who are unable to use the fixed-route service.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Fresno will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained within the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

F. City of Huron

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement with the City of Huron contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC) as the Rural CTSA for the provision of general public transportation service within the Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area utilizing two (2) FCRTA wheelchair accessible modified vehicles. The intra-city services are available, during an approximate eleven (11) hour period, Monday through Friday.

The City of Huron continues to provide funding for an inter-city "life-line" service to Coalinga. Two (2) round trips are provided during a seven (7) hour period, Monday through Friday.

Coalinga Transit also provides inter-city fixed route service, with route deviation to pick-up disabled passengers, between Coalinga and Fresno. The vehicle provides one (1) round trip through Pleasant Valley Prison, Huron, Five Points, Lanare, Riverdale, Caruthers, Raisin City and Easton, during an approximate eleven (11) hour period, Monday through Saturday.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Huron, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

G. City of Kerman

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement with the City of Kerman, provides demand responsive public transportation service with a FCRTA vehicle within its Sphere of Influence and surrounding area using a lift equipped FCRTA vehicle, for approximately eight (8) hours a day, Monday through Friday.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Westside Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, for approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicles, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Firebaugh, Mendota, San Joaquin and surrounding unincorporated communities, and Kerman and "to" and "from" Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Kerman, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

H. City of Kingsburg

Two (2) FCRTA wheelchair lift equipped vehicles are available for providing public transportation services to Kingsburg Area residents. These transit services are provided by the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA, to the City of Kingsburg under an inter-agency services agreement with FCRTA. Service within the Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area, are available on a demand responsive basis during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour service period, Monday through Friday and approximately eight (8) hours on Saturday utilizing just one (1) vehicle.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Southeast Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Kingsburg, Selma, and Fowler and "to" and "from" Fresno.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Kingsburg, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

I. City of Mendota

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency agreement with the City of Mendota, contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA, to provide demand responsive service within its Sphere of Influence and surrounding area using a FCRTA lift equipped vehicle. This service is provided Monday through Friday, for approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hours per day.

Firebaugh Transit has a second vehicle, which is available for inter-city trips between Firebaugh and Mendota during an approximate nine and one-half eight (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Westside Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Firebaugh, Mendota, San Joaquin and surrounding unincorporated communities, and Kerman and "to" and "from" Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Mendota, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

J. City of Orange Cove

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement with the City of Orange Cove contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA, for the provision of transportation services. Orange Cove Transit operates a FCRTA lift equipped vehicle on a demand responsive basis within its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area for approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hours per day, Monday through Friday.

Orange Cove Transit also provides a lift equipped vehicle for inter-city fixed route service. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, Sanger, and "to" and "from" Fresno. Multiple round trips are available each service day. The inter-city service is provided, during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Orange Cove, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

K. City of Parlier

Under an inter-agency services agreement, the City of Parlier and FCRTA currently contracts for transportation services with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA. Parlier Transit operates a lift equipped demand responsive service within its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area using a wheelchair lift equipped FCRTA vehicle. Service is currently provided, during an approximate eight (8) hour period, Monday through Friday.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Orange Cove Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, and Sanger and "to" and "from" Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Parlier, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

L. City of Reedley

The City of Reedley, through an inter-agency services agreement with the FCRTA, provides demand responsive public transportation within its Sphere of Influence and surrounding area, using four (4) vehicles on an eight (8) hour staggered basis and one (1) vehicle on a six (6) hour staggered basis during an approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour service period, Monday through Friday, and one (1) vehicle on Saturdays during an approximate eight (8) hour period.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Orange Cove Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during an approximately nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, and Sanger and "to" and "from" Fresno.

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Reedley, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

M. City of Sanger

To provide public transportation service within the Sanger Sphere of Influence and the surrounding area, the FCRTA, under an inter-agency services agreement, with the City of Sanger contracts with Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA. Three (3) wheelchair accessible FCRTA vehicles offer service in Sanger. The vehicles provide staggered service during an approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, and one (1) vehicle during an eight (8) hour period on Saturday.

FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Orange Cove Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped bus, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, and Sanger and "to" and "from" Fresno.

An additional vehicle will be providing service between Sanger and Reedley College in the coming year to support a new training program to address a critical concern by manufacturers in Sanger who have been unsuccessful at finding skilled workers to employ and residents in Sanger who are underemployed or unemployed. The new program is being designed in cooperation with the new President of Reedley College and the manufacturing companies. As a service expansion, FCRTA's Measure-C funds will be utilized to fund the operation. The service must maintain minimum performance characteristics (passenger per hour, passengers per mile, cost per mile, cost per passenger, and achieve a minimum farebox recovery of 10% of our operating costs from passenger fares) in order to ensure continuation.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Sanger, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

N. City of San Joaquin

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency agreement with the City of San Joaquin, contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA, for demand responsive Intra-City service within their Sphere of Influence and surrounding area. Inter-community service is also provided between the unincorporated communities of: Cantua Creek, El Porvenir, Halfway, Three Rocks, and Tranquility. Inter-City service to Kerman is also available. These services are provided, during a nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday using an FCRTA lift equipped vans.

Ridership demands continue to increase and may warrant a second vehicle, for operation during an eight (8) hour period. The expanded service will be done on a demonstration basis when warranted to carry additional passengers to ensure access to Fresno, Mendota, and Firebaugh on Westside Transit. The additional service expansion will be funded by FCRTA's Measure-C funds.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Westside Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday, using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Firebaugh, Mendota, San Joaquin and surrounding unincorporated communities, and Kerman and "to" and "from" Fresno.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of San Joaquin, its Sphere of Influence, and the surrounding area with its identified unincorporated communities will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

O. City of Selma

The FCRTA, under an inter-agency agreement with the City of Selma, contracts with the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA, for demand responsive and fixed route Intra-City service within their Sphere of Influence and surrounding area.

This service utilizes five (5) FCRTA wheelchair accessible vehicles. It operates four (4) vehicles on a demand responsive basis; three (3) for eight (8) hours each on a staggered basis, and one (1) for four (4) hours for lunch time driver relief, Monday through Friday, during an approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hours service day. A fifth (5th) vehicle is operated on a fixed route basis, Monday through Friday, during an eight (8) hours service period. Saturday demand responsive services are provided with a single (1) vehicle during an approximate eight (8) hour service period.

The FCRTA also contracts with the Rural CTSA to operate Southeast Transit as a multiple round trip general public commuter service, during approximate nine and a half (9-1/2) hour period, Monday through Friday using a lift equipped vehicle, which may deviate from its route to pick-up disabled passengers. The service is provided on a scheduled fixed route to serve patrons "between" Kingsburg, Selma, and Fowler and "to" and "from" the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA).

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the City of Selma, its Sphere of Influence, and surrounding Area will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

P. Fresno County

Fresno County financially participates through the Fresno County Rural Transit Agency for provision of service to unincorporated area residents within the Spheres of Influence and surrounding areas of the thirteen (13) rural cities and two dozen unincorporated communities situated on established fixed routes.

Fresno County also provides the funding for six (6) other unincorporated area transit services.

Auberry Transit is provided, through an inter-agency service agreement between the FCRTA and the Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC), as the Rural CTSA. The service area includes the communities of: Alder Springs, Auberry, New Auberry, the Big Sandy Indian Rancheria, Burrough Valley, Cold Springs Indian Rancheria, Jose Basin, Marshall Station, Meadow Lakes, Mile High, Prather, Sycamore, and Tollhouse. A lift equipped vehicle provides, approximately six (6) hours of service per day, Monday through Friday. A second Auberry Transit vehicle is to provide "life-line" inter-city service from the foothill communities and through Friant and the Table Mountain Indian Rancheria to the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area, one (1) day a week during an eight (8) hour service period.

Del Rey Transit operates as a general public demand responsive service. The Rural CTSA continues to fund the service four (4) hours per service day and Fresno County TDA monies fund the remaining four (4) hours. The service is under contract for driver services through the Rural CTSA and continues to be available during an approximate eight (8) hour period Monday through Friday. The operation will continue to maintain priority service to seniors attending the mid-day Hot Meal Nutrition Program. The service transports passengers within the community on a shared ride basis; arranges passenger grouping for trips to Sanger; and transfers passengers in Sanger to access Orange Cove Transit for service to Fresno, Parlier, Reedley, and Orange Cove.

Dinuba Connection is in its fourth (5th) year of service. In cooperation with the FCRTA, the City of Dinuba (in Tulare County) provides an inter-County service, referred to as the Dinuba Connection, between Dinuba and Reedley (in Fresno County). It allows Dinuba residents to travel from their City and its Vocational Training Center to the Adventist Medical Center (for on-the-job training) and to attend Reedley College. Eastern Fresno County residents travel to regional retail and entertainment centers in Dinuba. The service has proven to be very successful. The operations encourage transfers between Reedley Transit's Intra-City services and Orange Cove Transit's Inter-City services, to facilitate connectivity between Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, Sanger and Fresno. Both entities will continue to utilize a portion of their locally approved half cent sales tax (Measure R in Tulare County and Measure C in Fresno County) to continue to split the costs of this transit expansion program

Laton Transit continues to be provided by the FCRTA through an ongoing interagency services agreement with Kings Area Rural Transit (KART). Round trip, inter-community service between the unincorporated Community of Laton and the City of Hanford, in Kings County, is available Monday through Friday. An existing inter-County service by KART from Hanford through Laton and then Selma (Kaiser Clinic) and Hospitals in Fresno and the Central Valley Children's Hospital in Madera County is provided Monday through Friday.

Lanare Transit: A bilingual survey was mailed to each of the 155 community residents to determine their apparent transit needs. The service vehicle was on display at several community meetings, so residents could get on board and sit in the seats. The surveys were tabulated. Staff presented the results and offered alternative plans to the community group and sought their input towards a viable Demonstration Program that was tested for a minimum three (3) month period which began 0n 9/8/14, however it went beyond this period due to changes in the service days and hours. This subsystem budget had set aside FCRTA's Measure-C funding for the demonstration period, and continuation through the year, which did not prove to be viable.

The residents appreciated the possibility of an inter-community service along Mt. Whitney Avenue that would include: Five-Points; Lanare; Riverdale; and Laton.

Ridership data was recorded and evaluated to determine if any adjustments are warranted. Minimum performance criteria (passengers per hour, passengers per mile, cost per hour, cost per passenger, cost per mile, and the minimum ten percentage (10%) ratio between farebox receipts versus operating cost) must be met to justify service continuation.

This service will terminate as of June 30, 2015 since ridership and the 10% farebox was not met.

New Freedom Transit is a service that has been talked about for several years. Staff was concerned that Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations stipulated that the maximum wheelchair lift capacity was not to exceed 600 pounds. Staff was made aware that an obese person in a powered wheelchair with two (2) batteries, and related supportive equipment with a back-pack for personal items could easily exceed the weight limit.

There have been tragic incidents where individuals could not be transported for medical appointments, etc. Staff received Grant funding to purchase two (2) vehicles that could expressly address the need. FCRTA completed a procurement of low floor vehicles, with kneeling suspension systems and a ramp that is rated at 1,000 pounds. There are up to three (3) wheelchair locations with multiple tie down configurations at the front of the vehicle to accommodate the service.

Also purchased with another Grant were two (2) vehicles with up to six (6) wheelchair locations that may be accessed independent of each other. The ability to transport that many wheelchairs at one-time will be of benefit when a group wants to go to a common location in the County. It will also allow the FCRTA to provide emergency services in the event of a natural or man-made disaster.

The services are programmed to begin after July 1, 2015, as our marketing and outreach effort take place.

Rural Transit between remote areas of Fresno County has been mentioned in the Regional Transportation Plan and Rural Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) for many years. The Measure-C Expenditure Plan referenced the concept for funding and implementation. Service beyond the current transit service areas associated with incorporated cities has been difficult to justify. Following the successful passage of Measure-C in November 2006, the FCRTA is in its third (5th) year of offer such a service. The 2015-16 FCRTA Budget continues to reflect Measure-C funding for the "Rural Transit" service. Four (4) vehicles were purchased to facilitate the operation of three (3) in regular services, Monday through Friday, with the fourth (4th) reserved as a back-up vehicle. The adopted Rural SRTP reflects the demand responsive operation to be available on a twenty-four (24) hour prior reservation basis. Transfers to existing operations have eliminated service duplications. The FCRTA continues to contract with Fresno Economic Opportunities Commission (FEOC) as the Rural Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (Rural CTSA) for the provision of this transportation services.

Shuttle Transit is to address another transit need. For many years, it has become evident that when riders from rural Cities arrive in Fresno they have problems utilizing the fixed route services of Fresno Area Express (FAX) to get to their destinations, conduct their business and return back downtown to catch their return bus back to their respective rural City. Frail elderly and disabled have significant problems attempting to qualify as a user of the Handy Ride services. Those wanting to get to an employment opportunity, educational institution, training program, medical appointment or other facility learn that it is nearly impossible to rely on public transportation.

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) recognized the problem nationwide, and sought to address the matter. They created another Program that is called Job Access / Reverse Commute (JARC). Initially it sought competitive applications, and selected a few for partial funding for a one (1) year demonstration period. The applicant was responsible for the funding in subsequent years. It really was not attractive to small rural operators with very limited funding in the first place.

With the passage of Measure-C, the FCRTA has an opportunity to implement a supportive program. The FCRTA has four (4) inter-City subsystems that provide service to the Fresno Metropolitan Area. They include: Coalinga Transit (from Coalinga, Huron, Five Points, Lanare, Riverdale, Caruthers, Raisin City, and Easton); Orange Cove Transit (from Orange Cove, Reedley, Parlier, and Sanger); Southeast Transit (from Kingsburg, Selma, and Fowler); and Westside Transit (from Firebaugh, Mendota, Kerman, with connections from San Joaquin).

The Shuttle services are intended to meet the inter-City buses as they arrive in Fresno. The fares would be the same as FAX, \$1.25 per one-way trip. The riders could call the Centralized Dispatch phone number 1-800-325-7433 to arrange service. The FCRTA has four (4) vehicles, three (3) primary and one (1) back-up. The service can begin after July 1st, and of course it would be subject to minimum performance criteria to warrant continuation.

Staff intends to promote the new services with rural residents who want to come to Fresno. The service is budgeted to begin after July 1, 2015.

Recommendation:

It is recommended the Fresno COG Policy Board find that public transportation needs within the unincorporated portions of the County of Fresno will be reasonably met. Service requirements contained in the Regional Transportation Plan will be satisfied.

Additional Information

It should be noted additional transit needs are being met through three (3) other programs, which have been implemented with Measure – C funds. The Fresno COG administers the programs:

 <u>Carpooling</u> - A subsidized carpooling program is available for individuals willing to share rides with others. A computerized program may assist individuals in making successful contacts to form successful arrangements to conveniently share rides.

- Commuter Vanpooling A subsidized vanpooling program is available for a group of individuals who may have common interests in commuting for employment or schooling at City Colleges and Universities. Several commercial entities have complete programs to provide vans ranging from seven (7) to fifteen (15) passenger capacities. A lead and back-up driver volunteer to make arrangements to transport the group as needed. The vehicle, fuel, maintenance, and insurance are covered. Participants share in a portion of the costs. Several hundred vehicles are currently in operation, and more are being formed on a regular basis.
- Farm Labor Vanpooling A subsidized farm labor vanpooling program facilitates group transportation to field and packing facilities. The program is flexible to meet the seasonal needs of the workers, originating in Fresno County. Fifteen (15) passenger vans accommodate seven (7) to fifteen (15) individuals. A lead and back-up driver volunteer to make arrangements to transport the group as needed. The vehicle, fuel, maintenance, and insurance are covered. Participants share in a portion of the costs. Several hundred vehicles are currently in operation, and more are being formed on a regular basis.

SUBJECT: UNMET PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION NEEDS

The Fresno Council of Governments (Fresno COG), as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency, is responsible for annually ensuring that public transportation needs are being "reasonably met". Each year the Fresno COG conducts an extensive process to plan, program, and evaluate existing and potential general public and social service transit services within Fresno County.

The Fresno COG's Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) was established to address transit issues within Fresno County. It is composed of a broad representation of social service agencies, transit operators and users, and is responsible for forwarding recommendations to the Fresno COG Policy Board regarding transit needs and issues.

As part of the annual process to identify possible unmet transit needs within Fresno County, we invite individuals and organizations such as you, to contribute comments. If you are aware of a specific transit need that is not currently being met by one of the existing general public, social service or private sector operators, we request that you submit information regarding any unmet transit needs to assist staff in evaluating the potential for additional transit service. In order to evaluate potential services, we are asking you to provide as much information as possible. The specific information that will be most helpful includes:

- - Where new service is needed, and where the potential trips would start and end;
 - When and how often trips would need to be scheduled;
 - A description of the individuals needing the service including age group, financial constraints, and whether they have disabilities requiring special services.

The information will be used by the SSTAC to evaluate potential new services before it makes a determination and recommendation regarding "unmet transit needs" to the Fresno COG Policy Board prior to its public hearing on this matter. The public hearing will be held on June 25, 2015 during the Fresno COG Policy Board Meeting.

Thank you for your letter dated March 17, 2015, regarding Unmet Transit Needs. Your concerns regarding transportation needs in the southeast region of the City of Fresno have been communicated to the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) for its review and comment.

The service you suggested, increased frequency to the Butler and Burgan area, is operated by Fresno Area Express as Route 22. There are 11 stops associated with the Butler and Burgan loop. For the period of January 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014 the daily boardings for all stops was 5.25. The demographics for the area are not the same as the typical transit rider. According to the American Community Survey (2009-2013), the average income for residents in this area is over \$71,000 per year and over 75% of the households have 2 or more cars. Less than 2% of the households do not have access to a vehicle. These indicators, along with existing transit ridership, do not support the need for additional transit service

In addition, the City of Fresno allocates all of its Local Transportation Funds (LTF) to public transit; an Unmet Needs finding in the FCMA will not serve to bring additional funds to the City of Fresno to implement service. The SSTAC did not find these concerns to qualify as an unmet need that is reasonable to meet.

Mr. Hyatt:

I am writing to provide the Fresno Council of Governments' Social Services Transportation Advisory Council information regarding unmet transportation needs on behalf of California State University, Fresno. Fresno State has a strong working relationship with both Clovis Transit and the Fresno Area Express (FAX) and we actively collaborate with both agencies on a number of initiatives.

Fresno State's Campus Master Plan identifies a number of initiatives to encourage active transit and connect the campus with the transit-oriented development in the cities of Fresno and Clovis.

As a part of the Campus Master Plan, Fresno State has undertaken improvements to enhance walkability on its east-west lateral, with the goal of connecting the campus via one contiguous pedestrian artery from El Dorado Park to Campus Pointe. The Campus Master Plan and the City of Fresno General Plan both envision a transit center located on the Fresno State campus; creating a comfortable place to allow for off-street bus boarding and to better facilitate transfers. With 46% of riders making at least one transfer and Fresno State being a convergence of FAX lines 9, 28, 38 and Clovis Stageline route 10, there is strong data to support a transit center on campus. Also in summer 2015, it is planned for a Yosemite Area Regional Transportation stop which will be located on campus.

Slightly over ten percent of Fresno State students live within a mile of campus. Due to a number of factors, many of these students purchase a parking permit and drive to campus. Fresno State desires to align routes with student travel patterns; the university is eager to help achieve this goal. One of the key unmet service needs is a regular Barstow Avenue bus service.

The university would like the addition of a 15-minute neighborhood circular route via Barstow Avenue from Campus Pointe to Blackstone Avenue. This route would connect El Dorado Park residents and Fresno State students to the Fresno State campus, retail, and bus transfers on Blackstone Avenue. The university would gladly take the lead in pursuing feasibility and ridership of this route as well as soliciting third party funding opportunities.

To the west of Fresno State is the El Dorado Park neighborhood. The neighborhood's poverty rate is 56.7% (US Census American Communities Survey 2006-10, tract 54.04) with a median income of \$16,607. 88.7% of families are in poverty, as are 100% of families with children under the age of five. As 56% of FAX riders have annual incomes less than \$10,000, this impoverished neighborhood is a prime area for increasing transit service, in coordination with other improvement

initiatives, could bring an improved quality of life to its residents, connecting them with employment opportunities, public services, and fresh food.

In addition to a Barstow Avenue route, it is also essential to our students and employees that FAX consider operating routes 9 or 28 on a fifteen minute headway. There is currently no east-west route with less than a thirty minute headway. Related to exiting transit service, student and employees would benefit greatly and utilize transit more if there was real-time information about bus service. A system such as NextBus, with a mobile web and app-based interface would help mitigate these concerns.

Thank you for your letter dated March 19, 2015, regarding Unmet Transit Needs. Your concerns regarding transportation needs in the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA), specifically around the Fresno State Campus and the El Dorado Park neighborhood have been communicated to the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) for its review and comment

The service you suggested, an east—west route along Barstow, has been identified by FAX planning staff as a potential need. It was identified along with Bullard Ave. and Herndon Ave. as potential east-west corridors. In regards to this service qualifying as an unmet need, SSTAC reviewed the service in the area and determined that both EI Dorado Park and Fresno State are well served by public transit. Each area is within a ½ mile walk to multiple routes, some with frequencies as low as every 20 minutes.

As for your other concerns, FAX currently operates Route 28 to the campus on 20 minute frequencies Monday through Friday approximately 6:00 am to 6:00 pm. This is the highest level of service currently available in the FAX system. It may be of interest to know that FAX is currently evaluating increasing frequencies on Shaw Avenue to 15 minutes and is close to implementing a web based trip planning system that will provide scheduled bus information at the stop level.

The City of Fresno allocates all of its Local Transportation Funds (LTF) to public transit, an Unmet Needs finding in the FCMA will not serve to bring additional funds to the City of Fresno to implement service. On-going operating funds would need to be identified for this level of service. In addition, any new service would have to meet minimum productivity levels to continue operating. The SSTAC did not find these concerns to qualify as an unmet need that is reasonable to meet.

Juvenile Justice Campus Transit: For the second time in recent years, a three (3) month demonstration service between Downtown Fresno and the Fresno County Juvenile Justice Campus at Highway 99 and American Avenue was initiated. The second phase of the Campus included the Administrative and Courtroom Complex. Staff worked closely with approximately twenty (20) employees from the departments of Public Works, Probation and the Judges. It was anticipated that the general public and county employees might need transit service to the fully functional Campus. The service began the day of the dedication, July 6, 2009. The service was provided with a twenty-two (22) passenger van, on a scheduled fixed route basis Monday through Friday. Service was provided from 7:30am to 5:30pm. Ten (10) round trips were available, leaving Downtown Fresno and arriving fifteen (15) minutes later to shuttle passengers around before leaving fifteen (15) minutes later for the return trip. The resulting daily ridership averaged just five (5) round trips. The minimum performance standard was forty (40) daily round trip passengers, or just four (4) round trips per hour. Therefore, the actual ridership was one-eighth (1/8) the minimum standard. Resulting farebox receipts were only two percent (2%), the minimum is 10%. The \$1.00 one-way fare would need to be raised to \$8.00 (\$16 a round trip) to meet the minimum 10% requirement. Clearly, the minimum performance standards did not meet expectations, so following the publication of a "Legal Notice"; the service was discontinued thirty (30) days later, on November 13, 2009.

Jeff Long (FCOG/FAX) presented this item noting that the Fresno COG Policy Board must determine that public transportation needs within Fresno County will be reasonably met in Fiscal Year 2015-16 prior to approving claims of Local Transportation Funds for streets and roads. The Fresno COG's Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) is responsible for evaluating unmet transit needs. Each year the SSTAC begins the process of soliciting comments from the public by sending approximately 400 letters to agencies and individuals interested in providing feedback on their public transportation needs within Fresno County. The request for comments letters, English and Spanish, were sent on February 7, 2015.

In addition to the request for written comments, SSTAC held three information-gathering meetings.

The first outreach meeting was held in the City of Huron, on February 17, 2015, in the City Hall Council Chambers at 36311 Lassen Ave., Huron, CA 93234. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Western Fresno county including: Coalinga, Firebaugh, Huron, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The second meeting was held in the City of Clovis on February 18, 2015 in the Clovis Senior Activity Center at 850 4th Street, Clovis, CA 93612. The location was selected to facilitate comments from the residents of the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area (FCMA) and surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was 5:30 p.m. No comments were received.

The final outreach meeting was held in the City of Selma, on February 19, 2015, in the City Council Chambers at 1710 Tucker Street, Selma, CA 93662. The meeting location was set to facilitate comments from the residents of Eastern Fresno county including: Fowler, Kingsburg, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, Selma, and the surrounding unincorporated communities. The meeting time was set for 5:30 p.m. One comment was received regarding staffing on the intercity bus passing through Selma in route to the City of Fresno. Gary Joseph, FEOC Manager and operator of this service responded to the inquiry. This issued was not related to Unmet Needs.

The SSTAC Chairman received two (2) letters and one (1) email regarding perceived "Unmet Transit Needs". Copies of the actual letters and Staff response are attached to this Report. They are summarized as follows:

- 1. The first comment letter was from the County of Fresno Public Works Department, concerning service in the southeast part of Fresno.
- 2. The second comment email came from Mr. David F. Rodriguez, Senior Deputy County Counsel, regarding service to the Juvenile Justice Campus.
- 3. The final comment letter came from Mr. Tom Gaffery from Fresno State University, concerning service in the area of the University and El Dorado Park.

After thorough review of all items, the Social Services Transportation Advisory Committee (SSTAC) found there to be no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet in Fresno County.

Mayor Dhaliwal opened the Public Hearing. There being no comments, the Public Hearing was closed.

A motion was made by Mayor Hill (Kerman) and seconded by Mayor Lopez (Orange Cove) to approve Resolution 2015-16 making the finding that there are no unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet in Fresno County. A vote was called for and the motion carried.
